Students insured through companies other than the school-sponsored insurance plan must contact their insurance company for a referral. The testing must be performed by a licensed clinical psychologist and must be consistent with the guidelines for Medical and Psycho-Educational Requirements for ADHD Evaluations on the reverse side of this document.

Medical and Psycho-Educational Requirement for ADHD Evaluations

Patients of this facility who wish to receive services for **Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD)** must provide their clinician with the appropriate documentation. The following criteria are recommended to be met:

<p>A. Psycho-Educational Evaluations:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. Must be completed by a licensed psychologist.2. Diagnostic evaluation must have been completed within the last 5 years.3. The diagnostic criteria from the DSM-V should be used as the criteria for the diagnosis.4. Assessment instruments used to conduct the evaluation should be norm-referenced and designed to accurately assess attention problems. These include but are not limited to:<ul style="list-style-type: none">– WAIS– Woodcock-Johnson III Tests of Achievement– Woodcock-Johnson III Tests of Cognitive Abilities– Current Symptoms Scale – Self-Report Form: Other Report Form*– Childhood Symptoms Scale – Self-Report Form: Other Report Form*– Work Performance Rating Scale – Self-Report Form*– Employment History Rating Scale*– Development History Rating Scale*– Social History Rating Scale*– Michigan Alcohol Screening Test– J Barkley Deficits in Executive Functioning Scale (BDEFS)– Thomas Brown Executive Function Scales *Forms from Barkley & Murphey (1998) <p>The report summary should integrate the assessments in a manner that validates or invalidates the diagnosis of ADHD and its subtype. Additionally there should be a statement that summarizes whether or not there are ADHD symptoms that cause current impairments. If there are impairments, the statement should address whether or not they are substantial, chronic, and exist across settings.</p>	<p>B. Medical Evaluations:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. Appropriate psycho-educational evaluation supporting the diagnosis of ADHD (See “Psycho-Educational Evaluations”).2. A personal medical history, family history, and physical exam.3. Appropriate pre-medication lab work including annual CBC, CMP, TSH and any other labs determined necessary by clinician. May include a urine drug screen initially and randomly at the clinician’s discretion.4. Pre-medication EKG.5. Generally ongoing monthly follow-up or alternate schedule as determined by clinician.6. Students can get the testing done in their home communities with a licensed psychologist and fax the report to our medical records office: (850)-644-27377. Clinician may review the suggested resources for ADHD listed below
	<p>C. Psycho-Educational and Medical Evaluations:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Clinician shall review with patient and patient shall sign the document, <i>ADHD Information Concerning ADHD Medications for Students</i>.
